In the course of processing your 30 May 2009 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of Defense for records on Operation Tipped Kettle, the Department of Defense located CIA material and referred it to us on 23 October 2009 for review and direct response to you.

We reviewed the material and determined that there is CIA information in the documents that must be withheld. Deletions were made on the basis of FOIA exemptions (b)(1) and/or (b)(3). Copies of the documents and an explanation of exemptions are enclosed. As the CIA Information and Privacy Coordinator, I am the CIA official responsible for this determination. You have the right to appeal this response to the Agency Release Panel, in my care, within 45 days from the date of this letter. Please include the basis of your appeal.

Explanation of Exemptions

Freedom of Information Act:

- (b)(1) exempts from disclosure information currently and properly classified, pursuant to an Executive Order;
- (b)(2) exempts from disclosure information, which pertains solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of the Agency;
- (b)(3) exempts from disclosure information that another federal statute protects, provided that the other federal statute either requires that the matters be withheld, or establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld. The (b)(3) statutes upon which the CIA relies include, but are not limited to, the CIA Act of 1949;
- (b)(4) exempts from disclosure trade secrets and commercial or financial information that is obtained from a person and that is privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) exempts from disclosure inter-and intra-agency memoranda or letters that would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) exempts from disclosure information from personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of privacy;
- (b)(7) exempts from disclosure information compiled for law enforcement purposes to the extent that the production of the information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings; (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication; (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy; (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of a confidential source or, in the case of information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source; (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law; or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger any individual's life or physical safety;
- (b)(8) exempts from disclosure information contained in reports or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, or on behalf of, or for use of an agency responsible for regulating or supervising financial institutions; and
- (b)(9) exempts from disclosure geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

Need for Man-portable Weapons Captured by

Israeli Forces in Lebanon

- 1. This Agency has a priority requirement for the man-portable weapons captured by the Israelis during their recent incursion into Lebanon. Most of these weapons are of Soviet or Communist Bloc origin which offer particular application in the conduct of special activities and unconventional warfare where friendly forces are primarily dependent on battlefield recovery for arms resupply.
- Types of weapons would include, but are not limited to, those listed in the attachment. These weapons are known to be in Israeli possession. In addition, any ammunition that may be acquired to support these weapons or other ordnance items, e.g., mines and hand grenades, would greatly assist in the support of various Agency programs.
- 3. While we recognize our current bargaining position with the Israelis is very low, we nevertheless request your assistance in seizing upon future opportunities in the area of security assistance and/or intelligence support programs to apply the leverage necessary to acquire these weapons at little or no cost to the U.S. Government.

1. In response to your memorandum of 17 November 1982 regarding captured weapons, we recommend that DOD continue in its efforts to acquire captured weapons directly from the Israeli Government.

3. Naturally, any new SovMat acquired under this arrangement will be shared with DOD as were the SA-9 and other Soviet missile systems.

I told him that we were very grateful for his support in obtaining Israeli-captured weapons before, and that I understood a survey team was going out to Israel this month to take a second look. I indicated that we would be very grateful for whatever additional hand-held weapons the team could garner for our use in our paramilitary programs. The Secretary said that he would be happy to support us and would make sure that the survey team would keep us in mind. Deputy Secretary Taft made a note to follow up.
